# **Prime Areas**

# **Physical Development**

# **22-36 months**

- Shows control in holding and using jugs to pour, hammers, books and mark making tools.
- Beginning to use three fingers (tripod grip) to hold writing tools.
- Beginning to be independent in self-care, but still often needs adult support.

# 30-50 months

- Draws lines and circles using gross motor movements.
- Uses one-handed tools and equipment, e.g. makes snips in paper with child scissors.
- Understands that equipment and tools have to be used safely.

# Ideas for home:

- Talk about your home address what is your house number?
- Use photographs to make a family tree Discuss who is in your family
- Make a name card to go on your bedroom door (Links with name recognition)

# **Communication and Language**

## **22-36 months**

- Single channelled attention. Can shift to a different task if attention fully obtained using child's name helps focus.
- Listens to others one-to-one or in small groups, when conversation interests them.
- Understands 'who', 'what', 'where' in simple questions (e.g. Who's that? What's that?
  Where is?
- Uses language as a powerful means of widening contacts, sharing feelings, experiences and thoughts.

## **30-50** months

- Focusing attention still listen or do, but can shift own attention. Is able to follow directions (if not intently focused on own choice of activity).
- Beginning to understand 'why' and 'how' questions.
- Uses vocabulary focused on objects and people that are of particular importance to them. Builds up vocabulary that reflects the breadth of their experiences.

# Personal Social and Emotional Development

#### **22-36 months**

- Separates from main carer with support and encouragement from a familiar adult.
- Expresses own preferences and interests.
- Shows understanding and cooperates with some boundaries and routines.
- Shows affection and concern for people who are special to them.

#### **30-50 months**

- Can select and use activities and resources with help.
- Welcomes and values praise for what they have done.
- Can usually adapt behaviour to different events, social situations and changes in routine.
- Demonstrates friendly behaviour, initiating conversations and forming good relationships with peers and familiar adults.

# **Specific Areas**

# Literacy

#### **22-36 months**

- Repeats words or phrases from familiar stories.
- Distinguishes between the different marks they make

#### **30-50 months**

- Shows interest in illustrations and print in books and print in the environment.
- Sometimes gives meaning to marks as they draw and paint.

# Expressive Arts and Design

#### 22-36 months

- Experiments with blocks, colours and marks.
- Beginning to use representation to communicate, e.g. drawing a line and saying 'That's me'.

## **30-50** months

 Understands that they can use lines to enclose a space, and then begin to use these shapes to represent objects

# **Understanding the World**

## 22-36 months

- Has a sense of own immediate family and relations.
- In pretend play, imitates everyday actions and events from own family
- Notices detailed features of objects in their environment.

# **30-50 months**

- Shows interest in the lives of people who are familiar to them.
- Remembers and talks about significant events in their own experiences.
- Comments and asks questions about aspects of their familiar world such as the place where they live or the natural world.

# **Mathematics**

## 22-36 months

- Recites some number names in sequence.
- Creates and experiments with symbols and marks representing ideas of number.
- Notices simple shapes and patterns in pictures.
- Beginning to categorise objects according to properties such as shape or size.
- Begins to use the language of size.

#### **30-50 months**

- Uses some number names and number language spontaneously.
- Uses some number names accurately in play.
- Shows interest in shape by sustained construction activity or by talking about shapes or arrangements.
- Shows interest in shapes in the environment
