### **Mathematics**

In Maths, we will be multiplying and dividing

3-digit numbers by 1-digit numbers. We will be converting between decimals and fractions and solving problems involving coordinates, pictograms, line graphs, area and

perimeter.

We will continue revisiting all of the multiplication facts up to  $12 \times 12$ .



#### Science

In summer term 1, we will be finishing our unit on 'Why is the sound of pop music enjoyed by so many?' and starting our new unit 'Which wild plants and animals thrive in your locality?' We will be identifying and naming living things in our school grounds,

classifying them into groups and

recognising that environments can change and that this can sometimes pose dangers to living things.



#### <u>History</u>

Our History topic is 'Crime and Punishment through the ages'. We will be finding out about crime and punishment for the Romans, the Anglo-Saxons, the Tudors, The Georgians and the Victorians.
